Glanmire Flood Relief Scheme Presentation



On the 26th of February 2024, a team of staff from Sorensen came to our school for a presentation to all 2nd year students on the works they are doing on the Glashaboy river.

This team included Ken Leahy, Sorcha Dale and Elaine Cronin, the head engineer of this project.

Background: Last year, Ms. J. Reeves' 2nd Year Geography class, Rang Caoimhe, were learning about rivers, and were wondering what works were being done on

the Glashaboy. Ms.Reeves encouraged some student-led research and found out that a flood relief scheme was being put in place.

Ms. Reeves got in contact with Ms. Cronin, and together they organized to meet each other in person. Ms. Reeves was accompanied by her students, including Clodagh Martin, Lauren Walsh, Joshua Waters and Vilson Stefoli, on the day of this meeting. They discussed about the work that was going on along the Glashaboy, and got a lot of information back from her. With this information, these students gave presentations to a few classes with the help of Claudio Greco, in our school. Ms. Reeves then planned a day where the Sorensen team could have a talk to the Second Years, with the help of Jack Abbott and Lucie Noonan Carmody.

Presentation Day: The team of engineers came and were introduced by Justin Jeyapragash and Damian Buchholz. I had to do a speech to introduce the guest speakers on the day. The team from Sorensens talked about how they are preserving the river and the inhabitants surrounding it, and they also talked about the building work being done to prevent another flood happening like Storm Babet (16th October 2023) They said they will finish the building in 2026, and they will replant/move any forestry cut down. We look forward to seeing the finished work in the coming years. We are looking forward to the guided fieldtrip to the river to see the changes that have been made. I have no doubt all of this research will help us greatly in our Junior cycle Geography exam next year.

GCC played De La Salle, Waterford in a Munster semi-final. The match was played at Villa FC in Waterford and it started at 12pm. Both teams started slow but at about 25 minutes into the match Adam Kelly got a great goal after a great assist from Sam O' Sullivan. Glanmire were unlucky not to get another goal before half time. The half time score was 1-0. De La Salle came back strong in the second half and scored an equalizer 15 minutes into the second half. After a few very unlucky chances, even hitting the crossbar at one point, the match ended in a draw and headed to extra time. After an intense 10 minutes a half with scoring chances for both sides, extra time ended 1-1 and the match went to penalties. CSPE guest speaker



As part of Ms. Reeves's CSPE class Rang Grainne 3rd year I organised a guest speaker from Edel house. Claire Harrington came in to talk about homelessness awareness for women and children in Cork city. She works for the Good

Shephard organisation who give housing to homeless families.

Ms. Harrington explained about the service of Edel house and the other services that the Good Shephard organisation run in Cork. Every night in Cork there are 45 -50 homeless women and children resident in Edel House, their emergency shelter. Their staff work with women, empowering them to return to independent living as soon as possible. With their help 80% of the women who seek shelter at Edel House move on within 3 months of admission.

Edel House is the only homeless shelter in Cork that can admit children. They can accommodate 10 families and 18 single women. Their shelter is full every night. In 2015, they supported 206 women and 81 children out of homelessness. However, in the same year, the housing crisis and demand for the services, meant that they turned away 375 women and 281 children. Other interesting facts that Ms. Harrington explained was that many of the women they cannot accommodate end up isolated, living in hotels and B&Bs. In response to this, Good Shepherd Cork now employ an outreach worker, based at Edel House, who engages directly with these women.

When a woman is admitted to Edel House, she is assigned a key worker who will assess her needs before implementing a detailed personal care plan. If necessary, this worker will advocate and liaise with statutory and voluntary agencies on her behalf, to ensure the best solutions are found. During their stay, residents are linked in with educational and social programmes to maintain self-esteem and build self- confidence and morale. Our staff team, assisted by volunteers, provide a range of social activities and classes throughout the year. They have a play therapist based at Edel House and children spend time with her on a one to one and in a group basis.

We have recently lodged an application for planning permission and hope to rebuild parts of Edel House in order to improve our accommodation for homeless women and children. I am glad I organised Ms. Harrington to come into my CSPE class as we all found her very interesting.
